

# Heathermount Newsletter Term 5

A warm welcome to the penultimate newsletter of this academic year!

As I write this, we are very much looking forward to marking the Queen's Jubilee in school on Friday 27 May and celebrating such a commitment to public service over the last 70 years – what a remarkable and historic achievement!

Earlier this term, we participated in World Mental Health week; the therapy team incorporated discussions with the children around mental health and how each one of us can ensure we look after ourselves as well as others. Older students were involved in a form group presentation with their tutor and were given opportunities to reflect and discuss this very important issue which is even more significant since the pandemic. Staff didn't miss out either! They embraced a change to the usual staff training programme and enjoyed tea and cake in the grounds and a game of rounders on a lovely sunny evening after school.

It was great that the PGL trip was able to go ahead just before the Easter holidays. This is an excellent opportunity for secondary students and our first residential in two years! Everyone had a fantastic time and I hope you enjoy looking at all the photos later in the newsletter.

Also, this week the secondary students took part in our own 'Heathermount's Got Talent' organised by one of the students for his silver arts award which was a wonderful success. The camaraderie and support the students showed one another exemplified the values we hold here at Heathermount.

Although COVID hasn't quite gone away, we have seen a marked shift towards "getting back to normal" with the reintroduction of assemblies, visitors on site and whole staff face -to-face training. This has been very welcome indeed, however, staff and students still have the option to wear a face covering if they are feeling anxious. We continue to maintain the control measures around ventilation, air purifiers and hand spraying within school.

#### **SEND Green Paper**

The Government released its SEND Green paper entitled "Right support, Right place, Right time" in March and the school has been involved in consultation sessions to feed in our thoughts and comments. It is an important starting point for some much-needed change to the current SEND system that is, unfortunately, simply not working for the vast majority of children and families.

You will find the link for parents to have their say on the Green paper later on in the newsletter, please take some time to have a look and feedback your comments so that the Government hear the views of children, young people, and families.

#### **Core values**

Our core value this term has been positivity and the winners are revealed further on in the newsletter. Congratulations to all three winners. Next term we will be having a whole school focus on resilience.

#### Site

There has been a lot of work going on throughout the year on improving the school site so that the buildings and grounds can further support the curriculum and learning opportunities for the students. After half term, we will be able to open an independent study room in the basement for use by the older students for specific projects and enterprise activities.

#### **Examinations**

Zoe has taken on the role of exams officer within school and Jean will be conducting access arrangements for our students. The exams officer role is a key role in the school, and I would like to thank Zoe for her excellent organisation skills this year and to Jean for ensuring access arrangements and assessments have been put in place for the students.

Our older students are currently completing functional skills exams and GCSEs have begun. I have been so impressed with how the students have coped and how seriously they have taken their exams. It can be a very anxious time for students and parents, but I'm sure all their hard work will pay off and they will be duly rewarded on results day.

#### Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme

The first ever D of E expedition will take place in June, and this is a very exciting time for both students and staff. The benefits of the scheme are well known and thank you to Harriet, Richard, and Dani for

organising and delivering the scheme to our students. Some of our bronze level students may get the chance to go on to their silver and gold awards at their next setting.

#### Visitors to school

We have welcomed a range of visitors into school this term as COVID restrictions have been eased. Two learning mentors from Thames Valley School spent a day observing and talking to our staff on the best ways to support children with autism. The feedback we have received is that they were "blown away" by the school and have lots of ideas to take back to their school to help support their own students.

There have been two twilight sessions this term for staff where we have had the Headteacher and Educational Psychologist from Beech Lodge School come in to talk about how they support their students who have significant trauma and attachment needs. The sessions were very informative and gave us all lots to think about and reflect on when it comes to supporting our own students who have experienced trauma and attachment earlier on in their life.

Nikki Kennedy (NAS Autism Accreditation Assessor) has, this week, made a monitoring visit to see how we are continuing to embed high quality autism practice within school and to look at the impact the sensory circuit programme has had since it was introduced over a year ago.

The Disabilities Trust has visited recently; Keeley (Director of Brain Injury) and Neil (QA team) came in to have a look around the school to see what we do and how they can further support the school.

There have also been the usual regular visits from Anne-Catherine (Chair of Governors), who always takes such a keen interest in the school and provides us support as well as a significant level of challenge.

Finally, thank you for completing the recent parent questionnaire; your time and feedback is greatly appreciated and we will be acting on the results next term.

I hope you enjoy reading the newsletter and seeing the fantastic learning opportunities that your children have been engaging with during the last few weeks. The details of the classes for next year will be coming after half term.

Have a lovely half term break and enjoy the 4-day bank holiday celebrations. I look forward to welcoming the children back for our final term of the year on Monday 6 June.




### **Foundation**


Ash
















Ash class also had a fantastic time when they visited The Look Out recently on a school trip. The children were brilliant and had a great time!



Willow


Lessons Willow style...





The students are being encouraged to create stories using story dice and props; also promoting turntaking and listening skills.








### Oak

Here are Oak Class using the laptops to research information for their Geography topic, learning about France and using a large map of the world to locate France.













Here are a primary maths group working out the mean of sets of numbers.








AMAZING!

In Science the children have been busy learning about Chemistry and Physics this term.


**Mars** have been learning about how metals react with different materials, and have experimented reacting metals with acid, as well as learning about reactivity.

**Mercury** and **Neptune** have been busy learning about insulation and trialling different insulating materials.


**Pluto** have been learning about planet Earth.
